



Each of the Biblical Jewish holidays teaches us about our wonderful relationship with God. His whole redemption story is portrayed for us in these festivals.

Paul wrote to the Gentiles believers in Col. 2:16-17 that the holidays, "are a shadow of the things to come."

Each of the springs holidays are a picture of Christ's first coming. Jesus was sacrificed for our sins on Passover, buried on unleavened bread and arose on Firstfruits.

The fall holidays are a picture of His second coming and the beginning of the Messianic reign.

The three fall holidays are: The Feast of Trumpets, Day of Atonement, and Feast of Tabernacles.

The Feast of Trumpets or Rosh Hashana is the seventh month of the religious calendar and the first month of the civil calendar.

The New Year is ushered in with the sound of a ram's horn.

It is traditional to eat apples dipped in honey on Rosh Hashana.
